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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Government of Jammu and Kashmir in pursuance to National Higher Education Policy of making Higher Education accessible to all at their doorsteps with a view to improve gross enrollment ratio of the State, sanctioned Govt. Degree College Bishnah under State plan in the year 2007 to cater the Higher Educational needs of about 2 lakhs of population comprising of 68.3 % from SC,ST,OBC and other minorities spread all over the Bishnah Assembly Constituency along with certain areas of adjoining assembly segment Govt. Degree College started its functioning from the Govt. Higher Secondary School (Boys) Bishnah, after getting affiliation under2(f) & (12) from the University of Jammu in academic session 2008-09 Initially the college entered into Higher Education Deptt. with program me of Bachelor in arts having enrollment of 159 students comprising of 54 Male and 105 Female in B.A part-Ist, in basic subject of General English, Education, Hindi, Dogri, History, Pol. Science, Mathematics and EVS.Further, the college got sanction for introduction of new subjects of Library Sciences, Physical Education and Commerce & Management Studies in the institution. The State Government approved the construction of pre-engineering /pre-fabricated 04 classrooms and 04 science laboratories for introduction of sciences in the college. The project was completed in 2020 which has enabled the institution to introduce science stream from session 2021. The College adopted the semester system of UGC from academic session 2015-16 along with affiliation with University of Jammu and subsequently shifted to CBCS pattern of UGC, in15 subject combinations offered by the college for providing adequate flexibility to the students in choosing their AECC, SEC, GE and DSE as per their ability and competence .In 2020-2021 the subject combinations were raised to 25, providing options to the students. In GDC Bishnah, the percentage of SC students are very high in comparison to the categories OBC ,ST, and EBC and college is aimed at providing all sorts of financial assistance through social welfare schemes and by college itself to meet their educational need .Keeping in view the female students from rural areas the college has well established women cell taking all initiatives focuses on woman development programs to aware the females about their rights. Thecollege always eager to acquaint the students with culture varsities through cultural programs and their rendezvous with the current issues related to political social and economic changes through the activities besides academics. Therefore, equity initiatives and student's welfare services remain the top priority in preparation and execution of plans. GDCBishnah being nodal college has played major role in the establishment of two other colleges i.e GDC Purmandal and GDC Ramgrah.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. The College being sanction and established under state plan and govt. funded institution reorganized under Sec 2(f)12(B)of U.G.C Act, 1956 also eligible for financial aid under various state and central schemes. 2. The College is presently equipped with 100% experienced and senior teaching faculty comprising of 11 teachers with Ph. D qualification and 22 have been master degree including M. Phil, NET, SET, SLET Qualification having potential for achieving level of excellence in imparting quality education. 3. Govt. Degree College Bishnah is the only institution of higher learning for catering to the higher education needs of a population of about 2 lacs mostly rural areas of which ---- belongs to SC/ST/OBC and other minority out of which --- is between age group of 18-23 years having wider scope for bringing equity and constant increasing gross enrollment ratio in over and period of time. 4. In accordance with National policy for Higher Education, college has adopted Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) pattern of UGC since academic session 2016-17 in 15subjects' combinations and in 2020-2021 25combinations with introduction of Ability Enhancement Courses provide an adequate flexibility in academic curriculum to the students for opting courses according to their capabilities and competencies. 5. A safe, clean & conducive environment for all stakeholders. 6. The college is working hard to improve the infrastructure and providing facilities for disabled friendlywith ramps and washrooms for different abled students. 7. There is a strong bond and a high level of interaction between faculty and students. 8. The college has recently introduced sciences and Certificate courses in computer application and languages. 9. The College is also having a NSS unit with 100 NSS volunteers registered to serve humanity and selfless services to the mankind with an objective of "Not me but You". Recently, a summer internship program me of 100 hours under Swachh Bharat Mission was carried out in 2 Panchayat Halaga's 10. In order to strengthen the talent, skills and competencies of the students, the College has created number of clubs like literary club, Culture club, Eco-club, Sports club, Fitness club, Socio club, Red Ribbon club, Debating club, Electoral and Computer literary club, Carrier Counseling and Placement Cell, Grievances Redressal club, Society for women Development and Empowerment, Society for Creative Art, Mathematical Society and Society for language Promotion under Competent guidance of faculty members. 11.The College has a department of Sports and Games, for promotion of Sportsmanship among the College students which has produced many sports persons who won the medals in various sports competitions at College, Inter-Collegiate and Inter-University level. In addition to above the College is having a rich library having collection of tiles comprising of text books, reference books, general books and books relating to competitive exams, handled by a highly qualified and experienced librarian and also well-equipped science labs.

Institutional Weakness

1) Non-existence of College's own campus as presently housed in premises of Govt. Hr. Secondary School

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(Boys) with inadequate infrastructure in terms of class rooms, language labs, , Multipurpose hall, Separate Common room for girls, and boys, library Blocks, Sports Block, Canteen Block, NCC and NSS rooms, Departmental Staff rooms, conference hall, Hostel facilities both for Boy's and Girl's, Open learning Centre, Staff quarters and fair price shop, on make shift arrangement. 2) Non-availability of Multi stream UG Program me like B. Com, BBA, BCA/ Home science and other under graduate professional and skill Enhancement Courses, proving to be an obstacle in the growth of institution. 3) Non-availability of Sports infrastructure consisting of indoor and outdoor games and sports. The college is sharing the playground with boys higher secondry school 4) Non-existence of language labs; restricting the scope of skill enhancement courses particularly in field of languages, humanities and social sciences. 5) Working on developing Alumni network.

Institutional Opportunity

1. The college being established in the area predominated by the agriculture with existence of a number of industrial estates in the vicinity. As such, the students after graduation with specific capabilities and competencies have a greater opportunity to be employed in agricultural sector or may adopt professional techniques in Farming to increase their agricultural output or may adopt professional techniques in Farming to increase their agricultural output or may be adopting agricultural, horticulture and associated units like dairy farming, fisheries, poultry, floriculture, leading to increase their individual and family income. 2. Under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)pattern with introduction of different ability enhancement, skill development and discipline specific courses may lead to increase the ability of students in various areas providing them an opportunity to be Journalist, Translators, Script writers, Report writing and get more chances to be employed in various fields relating to media, communication and IT. 3. Strengthen academic curriculum in humanities and Social sciences along with other applied Knowledge based subjects to provide an edge to the students competing in the state as well as national level examinations. 4. The involvement of students in, NSS and Games and Sports will increase their ability and competence to join Armed forces.

Institutional Challenge

- 1. The major threat to the academic excellence of the institution is poor educational background of the students
- 2. The frequent changes in the pattern from Annual to semester system and subsequently from semester to Choose Based Credit System (CBCS) without proper training and orientation of the faculty leading to fast decrease in transitional and pass rate of the students.
- 3. Inadequacy of academic and financial autonomy to the institutions hampers its potential for growth.
- 4. The curricula of the students should cater to the need of job market .so every changing market requirement are to be kept in mind while restructuring the curriculum
- 5. Ensuring zero percentage failure.
- 6. The college wants to produce students who not only excel in various walks of life but also are exemplary human beings and responsible citizens of country.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

College creates an environment for enriching traditions by organizing the foundation day, Investiture ceremony, Annual Day, Parent-Teacher meet, Teacher-Student interactions, cultural programmes, skill enhancement programmes, seminars, debates, workshops, quiz and poetry competitions to accomplish the mission. In pursuit of excellence, the college has 21 highly qualified experienced and dedicated teaching staff including Assistant/Associate Professors, Physical Instructor and one Librarian. The College has 04 non teaching staff and 03 class IV and 09 Need based Employees for the smooth conduct of the college. Academic Programmes are very much in line with the institutional goals and objectives. Being a multidisciplinary institution, the college offers graduation in arts and Science (Medical and Non Medical). The College has EVS and department of Music also. EVS is a compulsory subject to give awareness to the students about ecology and environment. The college carried out the culture of the curriculum designed through: ? The feedback from the students through Grievance cell, student teacher interaction, parent teacher meet and intra college alumini meet. ? Feedback from teachers, HOD's, members of BOS. Their suggestions are invited for the development of the curriculum. Plan for future Growth and Development? The college has proposed to start Computer Science as subject.? Requirement of language lab and subject of Functional English. ? The college own building and campus. The institution adheres to the academic calendar. Our College GDC Bishnah is affiliated to University of Jammu, in this regard we follow the curriculum designed by the University of Jammu and we are always in constant touch with the University of Jammu for operationalisation of Curriculum. The college also adheres to the guidelines laid down by the state government(UT of J&K) in general and University of Jammu in particular. In the beginning of the session ,the academic calendar is prepared for the odd session and it contains the relevant information regarding the teaching, learning schedule. We try our best to provide 180 days of teaching in the academic year. The college observes the timing for the students and staff from 9.00 a.m to 3.00 p.m. Various events to be organized, holidays, dates of internal assessment examination, tentative dates for semesters final examination are displayed on the principal and students notice board for the information. Moreover, the college follows a specific time-table programme prepared by the Time-table committee and HOD's of the college for the effective delivery and transaction of the curriculum.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college made admissions strictly on merit basis. The information about admission process is shared on college website and through pamphlets. The notice is placed on college website also. During the admission process the members of admission committee interacts with the students and counselthem in selection of courses. The students are also provided with all the relevant information like the objectives, methodology, application and future prospectus. Various orientation programs and seminars are being conducted every year to provide exposure to the students for academic excellence. The academic calendar is also shared with the students on college website to make them aware about the dates of internal assessment, external practical, examination dates and ,vacations etc. The institution assesses the learning levels, concepts, understanding the abilities of the student at the beginning of the session through the process of interaction in class rooms and in addition to this the teachers understand the levels of students by conducting class and oral tests College display time table showing all the subjects with room no's and teachers for facilitating the students. Academic calendar is adhered to the maximum. A well devised teaching method is used to replace the traditional ones in order the make the students motivated satisfied and more productive. Many extension lectures/seminars are organized to aquatint the students with need and requirement of society and industry. At present the college has 22 permanent faculty out of them 11 are Ph.D. The faculty also keep themselves update with the pace of development in the field of knowledge through FIP, refresher course, orientation courses and attending, conducting seminars and conferences. The teachers has also published their research papers in reputed journals.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college aims at inculcating the values and commitments among the students towards society by their involvement in the basic social structure through their participation in the community work and its welfare. Besides, the academics the students are prepared to be responsible unit of society. To pursue this, the NSS wing during the last five years has taken initiatives like cleanliness and sanitation drives under the banner of "Swachhta Abhiyaan" in the campus as well as the adopted villages Ratnal and Chorli. To cultivate the sense of cleaniness among the masses and their contribution to make their surroundings clean and hygienic the Summer Internship programme proves to be a pioneering step where the interns during their 20 days camp took up the task of educating the locals about the cleanliness practices like segregation of wet and dry waste, dumping of garbage, digging of compost pit for manure, proper utilization of ground water, the less use of plastic and the ways to save the environment from further destruction .The NSS Wing also extended its help bto local administration to aware the locals/villagers about the government schemes for the construction of toilets to eradicate the menace of open defecation. The College has organized seminars and awareness programme as an endeavour to sensitize the students as well as the community to the social issues and concern such as female foeticide, girl education "Beti Bachao Beti Padao" and women awareness regarding their rights and their call to sexual harassment. Simultaneously college thrives upon the holistic growth of the student by conducting the practical sessions and lectures and on Yoga and Mental Health -A Best way of life .The blood donation camp and AIDS awareness is always remain the integral part of the college activity calendar which is well appreciated by the local administration from time to time under the Red Ribbon Club .In the direction of sustainable development the college continuously pouring its efforts to make the campus,a boon to the surroundings.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College aims to create physical infrastructure with latest technology as soon as it acquires its own campus. The total built up area in the college is 1440.00SQM comprising of 09 classrooms. At present the College has 04 smart classrooms, 04 well equipped laboratories, 01 browsing cum conference centre and a botanical garden in the College. College has a sports ground shared by both Boys Higher Secondary School and GDC Bishnah. First aid facility is also available in the college as the college has one medical Assistant in the College. There is also general staffroom, principal's chamber, establishment section, big library and sports room cum University section and one IQAC room. The college at present is having 36 computers equipped with internet facility. Safe and pure drinking water is also available for students and staff. The college has 3 Gensets with the capacity of 10, 15 and 30 KV to provide uninterrupted powersupply to the campus. The college has one bus providing to and fro service for the students.

Student Support and Progression

All round development of the students is the prime objective of any institution where the students are moulded into a responsible being. The institution is providing facilities to the students for their betterment and improving their performance in academic as well as other allied fields. Students from SC/ST/OBC categories and those from economically weaker sections are provided financial assistance in the form of financial aids and scholarships. Students are given exposure through different educational tours. It not only enhances their knowledge and understanding but also gives them hands on experience. They regularly visit different sites of environmental importance. Our college Bus provides an additional facility to the students coming from remote

villages. A committee is constituted in which the students are the part of it in framing modalities for the smooth functioning of this transport facility at concessional rates from college to adjoining villages. Our college has Placement Cell, Psychological Counselling Cell and Career Counselling Cell and it is in constant efforts to improve the performance of the students further by conducting various activities. Additionally, a Grievance Redressal and Sexual Harassment Cell/Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell Women Development Cell, and Internal Complaint Committeee address diverse issues pertaining to students. Special efforts are made by means of tutorials, practice tests and counselling to help them achieve higher levels of learning and performance in examinations. Seminars, conferences and lectures by experts in different fields are some of the activities organised for benefit of students and teachers. There is NSS unit in the college that give them exposure through different social activities and campaigns. The students are groomed in various sports activities and encouraged to participate in various sports events at different levels and even won several medals in sports activities. The college has different committees and societies and the students are encouraged to participate in competitions at different levels. Different types of cultural activities are also organised in the college and various students are motivated to participate in these college activities. Student's representatives are included in some of the committees such as Grievance Redressel committee, Internal Complaint Committee. College has a grievance/suggestion box for addressing their grievances and issues. Additionally, there is a online grievance redressal portal on college website. The Students Union of the college is involved in decision making on matters concerning them. The institution has newly created its Alumni Association and is constantly involving them in suggestions and feedback for improving quality of our institution.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision and mission document of the Institution have been worked upon time and again considering the available resources and the high aspirations of the far future whereas the strategic plan aims to achieve the short term goals. Operations like planning, development, administration, financial, purchase, accounts are done through fully digital mode while admission payments at the receiving and depositing end are in semi digital mode. The proposals and plans, executive functioning, decision making and so on all operate through the college committees in a very decentralised way in which members are headed by Convenor and Convenor functions in cognisance with the head of the institution. Teaching and non-teaching staff members are encouraged to undergo professional and technical training for their professional growth. The college receives most of the funds from the department of finance, government of Jammu and Kashmir and generates local funds of its own through admission. The Govt. funds are strictly used for the purpose and the designated heads under which they have been sanctioned whereas the local funds are utilized for the welfare of the students. Judicious use of financial resources is assured through external audits by the Accountant General (AG) of the state.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

For overall development of the institution values and social responsibility plays a dominant role. During the last five years our college has taken initiative for promoting gender sensitization programmes from time to time to empower women folk. Environment friendly campus is a need of the hour. maintaining discipline in the College by making uniform mandatory for both boys and girls. 1. The objective of village adoption is to develop the adopted village in an integrated manner. The village adoption means to work along with the community at the gross root level. The main objective is to aware the masses about various important issues like environment degradation, health and hygiene, gender equality, right to education etc. It also helps to inculcate a spirit of leadership & cooperation to enhance their communication skill. Practice The NSS unit of college has conducted various extension and outreach activities from time to time to aware the masses on certain issues which include awareness programme on Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan, save water campaign, importance of trees, voter education and electoral preparation etc. Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan was a week long program which includes rallies, lectures, presentations by the students as well NSS program officer and interaction programs with the villager to inform them about the importance of clineaniness. To promote importance of gender equality among the masses an awareness program on Beti Bachoo, Beti Padaoo was organised including plays, slogan writing etc.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

The GDC Bishnah has maintained adequate IT facilities and infrastructure for augmenting & enriching the teaching-learning process. The college has been updating and upgrading its IT facilities to ensure and maintain its pace with ever advancing technology. A separate computer lab was established in the college in the year 2011. The Lab started with 15 Desktop PCs and 2 Internet connections under National Mission in Education through ICT-2011. The lab was updated in 2013 and recently in 2021 with addition of 17 PCs, the computer Lab has been converted into Browsing Centre with total a total of 24 Computer Systems duly networked, one Interactive Panel with recent technology, one laser printer, one electronic lectern podium, a high speed internet connection BSNL Fibre Silver (300mbps upto 5000GB), an online UPS with a backup of one hour. The newly constructed Science Labs have also been provided with one All in One PC and one printer each. There is one AIO PC and one printer issued to the Staff Room with internet connection for facilitating the faculty members in their teaching process. The office has also been provided with 3 Computer Systems-one AIO PC and two Desktops and three Printers. The IQAC Room also has the facility of one AIO PC, a multifunction printer. The entire campus is under the surveillance of CCTV cameras. The College has also attuned itself to the good practices of the Good Governance such as an

official email id for receiving the communication from the Higher Education Department and replying to the queries, etc, an official Website www.gdcbishnah.com for depicting the description and other information related to the College, BEAMS for receiving the various grants and using the PaySys portal for the processing of the salaries, etc. Besides, the college has recently purchased four Interactive Board Panels for three classrooms and one Browsing Centre for enriching the teaching-learning process. There are two Online UPSs for the Office as well as the Browsing Centre. The college is having two functional Photostat Machines in the office for official and other purposes. For uninterrupted power supply for these ICT facilities, the college is having three Electric Generators of 10 KVA, 15KVA and 30KVA. The College is now planning to go for the automation of the library very soon.

Response:

The overall funding is done by the Higher Education Department for the augmentation and maintenance of physical, academic and other support facilities. The college also utilizes its local fund for the upkeep and utilization of these facilities. There are well established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities at the college leve. At the college level, there are various committees like the Development Committee, Purchase Committee, Bus Committee, Website Committee, Sports Committee, Library Committee, Browsing-cum-Conference Centre Committee, etc. involving the faculty members and the members from the college administrative office for the participatory decentralized decision making as far as the maintenance and utilization of various facilities of the college are concerned. The College Development Committee after taking requisition from all the HODs and conveners of other committees projects the plan for additional infrastructural requirement alongwith the maintenance of the existing infrastructure and facilities. The Plan is then submitted to the Principal of the college who then on the recommendations of the Purchase committee of the college takes up the additional projects and maintenance of the existing facilities with the Higher Education Department. After the allocation of the funds by the Administrative Department, the college then starts the process of maintenance of the infrastructure as per the requirement. The small repairs and maintenance in the college are done from the college pooled or local fund. The furniture repairs like the students' desks, lecture stand, tables etc are done on need based meeting the requirement out of the Repair and maintenance fund or pooled fund. The building repairs are undertaken after approval of the Administrative Department only. The repairs of the Computer Systems are done by outsourcing the same to the authorized service providers. For small repairs, the college meets the expenses out the local fund. The college bus is the responsibility of the Bus committee, which looks after all the requisite and repairs of the college bus so as to keep it in running condition. For the Browsing Centre/Conference Hall, the Browsing Centre takes care of the utilization and maintenance of same. The Library Committee is responsible for the purchase of books, journals, eresources and augmentation of other infrastructure of the Library. The Sports Committee is in place to maintain the playground for various sports events and also to encourage the students for participation in various events organized by the University of Jammu and other institutions. The requisition for repairs of desks, lecture stands, etc for the classrooms is is recommended by the Development Committee and the work is done by outsourcing the work through GeM or otherwise if the same is not available on GeM.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Response:

The college is housed in a rural area surrounded by the villages and the only institute of higher education in the tehsil of Bishanh. Therefore our primary responsibility is the dissemination of knowledge at the level of higher education by providing quality education at par with the urban institute of higher education of Jammu city. It also aims to inculcate the spirit of competency in academics and proficiency in skills which enables and empower students to face challenges of life. College also takes initiatives and responsibilities in inculcating in young hearts the social, moral and ethical values along with the academics and skills to make a way for the full fledged growth of a sense of responsibility as future citizens. These responsible citizens will take part in the socio economic development of our nation and pave the way for the stronger and developed New India as enshrined in the National Education Policy 2020.

Considering the local conditions, our institution pays special attention to the wards of village folks who are either mostly from agrarian background or from the low income group of the society. In this endeavour, we thrust upon the student welfare schemes that must reach every applicant who needs and deserves it the most. This is a step towards attaining socio-economic transformation in this rural part of the world.

Since the majority of the enrolments in our programmes are from rural women, various steps are already taken to ensure their safety, security and grievances through the mechanism of various cells, committees and CCTV technology. More is anticipated in this direction to start skill courses especially for women where they can be more creative and which also provide them an opportunity towards self reliance.

Introduction of eight new subjects in the last two years was done to provide options to students to match their aptitude and interest in the discipline. Two new streams; medical and non-medical started from the current session. Whereas four new subjects were added to the list which increases the subject combination count to twenty seven. More new subjects are also in the list to be added but due to infrastructural issues, we are restricted not to introduce the wide range of new programmes.

Introduction of more skill courses to uplift the economic well and contributing in the transition from agriculture based economy to the skill based society with high self sufficiency. In this direction,

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one certificate course in computers is also running in the college.

To equip college premises with the latest information and internet technology so as to facilitate teachers and students in a global pandemic period. To provide students with the various opportunities available in cyber space to widen their horizon of learning, to make teaching more creative, interesting and innovative. Because of infrastructural loopholes, we cannot expand and explore more in IT like starting MOOCS labs. But with little effort we have made the campus equipped with smart classrooms and wifi zones.

Response:

The college functions in a very democratic way where use of authority, decision making and execution is structured in a very decentralised way and is inclusive in nature and can function effectively only in the hands of those torch bearers who come forward to perform their duties with great passion and enthusiasm.

Decentralisation is visible in both academic and administrative level of coordination, execution, disbursement and participation.

1. Effective leadership in decentralisation and participative management at academic level:

Academic comprises regular teaching, organising, coordinating and participation in various cocurricular and extracurricular activities. Each department is headed by the HOD of the concerned subject. Various committees and clubs are constituted for organising and coordinating co-curricular and extracurricular activities including workshop, webinars, lectures, awareness programmes, field activities and so on. Teachers are members and conveners of different committees and the clubs at the same time. The members and the conveners of the clubs and the committees are organisers, coordinators, and signing authority of the expenses of the event. A bill of the event (for eg workshop) can be passed only if all the members and the convener of the organising committee signed the document. The bill documents must include the minutes of meetings of the committee duly signed by the members, conveners and the principal of the college. Even the administrative section is also part of the process of final sanctioning of the bills. This is how all the academic activities are decentralised and inclusive in nature. The use of authority, decision making and execution is not controlled, centralised in the hands of principal or senior faculty members. Effective leadership is visible in the various co-curricular and extracurricular activities organised by the college in last few years which includes two online national workshops, one online certificate course, counselling session of manodarpan, awareness programme organised by the red ribbon club, field activities of the NSS unit of the college, lectures organised by the placement and career counselling cells, CoVID vaccine drive initiative of the college and so on. This is possible only with the collective effort of the team under the guidance of the head of the institution.

1. Effective leadership in decentralisation and participative management at administrative level:

LIke academic, administrative work of the college also work through the collective efforts and in coordination of the different committees and clubs. All the major administrative decisions related to college development, infrastructure, future expansion, purchase at GEM portal, are decentralised and involve participation of the teaching and non teaching members of the college at every stage of its development. The college has introduced one new stream and eight new subjects in the last two years. The purchase of science lab materials, infrastructure of smart classes, making campuses equipped with wifi zones and CCTV surveillance are few initiatives in this direction. This has been made possible through the teamwork of the different committees which acts in a very democratic way.

Because of this big infrastructural hurdle, we cannot expand in academics and in providing student other necessary amenities required to enrich their experience at undergraduate level. College is lacking on many fronts at infrastructural level. It aims at providing basic amenities to students to explore co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in spaces like audiotorium, conference halls, sports complex and so on.

Within these limitations, college still managed to initiate some little expansion in academics. There was long pending demand of local population to start science stream in the college and it took many years to finally start one new stream of science with both medical and non medical branches. Starting science stream requires lot of funds for science laboratories. With regular correspondence with the higher education department for allocations of funds, finally one little success has been achieved. College has started Science stream from current session of 2021-2022 with both medical and non medical.

In arts stream, our institute has also managed to expand a little. In humanities Punjabi as subject is introduced from the current session of 2021-2022. The demand was also raised by the punjabi speaking population of adjoining villages.

College has also introduced three new subjects in arts last year session of 2021-2022. There was a frequent demand from the students community to introduce Physical education subject. Along with physical education two more new subjects; Management and Library Sciences were introduced in the session of 2021-2022.

Making the academic more diverse, our institute has also applied for affiliation of Music from university of Jammu, the file is under process and most positively we are going to start music as an option from the next academic session 2022-2023.

The college has got recognition under 12b and 2f from the University Grant Commission and affiliation from the University of Jammu but it comes under the Higher Education Department of the Jammu and kashmir Union Territory. The principal is the head of the institution. There is no sanctioned post of Vice-Principal but in her absence the senior most faculty member takes the charge of the chair.

The academic section of the college is spread in various departments of both arts and science streams headed by the HODs, composed of faculty members (associate Professors and Assistant Professors) and the students. The teachers are also involved in co-curricular activities and extra curricular activities through committees, clubs and cells.

The administrative section is a joint membership from both teaching faculty and non teaching staff of the college which functions or executes through committees. The administrative section is headed by senior assistant, composed of junior assistant, medical assistant and computer operator and so on to assist the committees to execute the works undertaken, implement the policies and actualize the decision taken in the meetings. The administrative unit is at the core of the executive part of the college which acts in a very democratic and decentralised way.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

College receives grants only from the department of finance through higher education department. The total grant received has always been divided into different heads. The principal office strictly utilise funds only on those specific heads under which they are released and tries to utilise the funds to the maximum before the end of the financial year. The funds are thoroughly allocated by the advisory committee among different committees like purchase, library, development and so on. These committees further work in coordination with the advisory committee and the head of the institution. The whole process of the mobilisation of funds is very decentralised and democratic.

The local fund is generated with the admission fee. Since the admission does not contribute much to the local fund because of the limited enrolment and university share, therefore it is very judicious used. There is no other source to generate local funds. The utilisation of the local fund also requires the recommendations of the concerned committee and duly signed by the convener and members of the executing body. Since local fund is the emergency reserve of the college therefore it is always kept under great scrutiny.

- 2. Extending the scope created in the Jammu and Kashmir official languages act 2020, which says "the institutional mechanism referred to in sub-section shall make special efforts for the promotion and development of Gojri, Pahari and Punjabi languages." (Part II section 1, point 4 [2] of The Jammu and Kashmir Official Languages Act, 2020, no. 23 of 2020).

3. Implementing the vision enshrined in NEP 2020 as expressed in chapter 22, Part III, New Education Policy 2020: "The tone, perception of experience, and familiarity/'apnapan' inherent in conversations among speakers of a common language are a reflection and record of a culture. Culture is, thus, encased in our languages. Art, in the form of literature, plays, music, film, etc. cannot be fully appreciated without language. In order to preserve and promote culture, one must preserve and promote a culture's languages."

Objectives of this course includes the following

- 1. Delimiting the horizon of language comprehension, especially for reading and writing Punjabi.
- 2. Reaching out Punjabi speakers who lack reading/writing skills.
- 3. Creating an opportunity to read Punjabi literature in Gurmukhi.
- 4. Providing a platform for creative writing in Punjabi to those who imagine and think in the same language but can not express it in its script.
- 5. Opening an option for those who are far away from their homeland and want to learn Punjabi from the beginning.
- 6. To increase enrolment in the subject of Punjabi in BA courses like Core Course, MIL, AECC, SEC, DSE, Punjabi Literature etc. in the colleges of Jammu and Kashmir.
- 7. Resolving the barrier of script for speakers of mutually intelligible languages.

The college is conscious about the environment as is reflected by its clean and serene campus. Some of the steps taken to manage solid, liquid and electronic waste are briefly outlined below:

Solid waste management

Waste management and recycling is routinely carried out by the college management to reduce volume of waste materials entering the waste stream. We have segregated recycling bins for biodegradable and non-bio degradable materials like paper, newspaper, cardboard drop-off and plastic, aluminium can. Students and staff were encouraged to avoid the use of plastics within the campus and various awareness programs were conducted from time to time for the same. Cleanliness drives were organized by the help of NSS unit and posters/slogans about cleanliness were also displayed within the campus.

E-waste management

End-of-life electrical and electronic equipment commonly known as e-waste is more complex than other waste streams in terms of material composition and the content of hazardous materials. Keeping this in the view our college has taken appropriate steps for the management of the e-waste. The equipment which cannot be refurbished for re-use is dismantled and re-manufactured into raw materials (i.e. metals, plastics, glass) to be marketed as recyclable. Defective and unused electronic items were stored properly and authorities have decided to dispose the same through proper e-waste management. UPS Batteries are recharged / repaired / exchanged by the suppliers.

Liquid Waste generated from the laboratories is disposed through the proper drainage system. Chemicals generated from Chemistry laboratories are properly treated and dumped into the pit.

Through the use of technology inside and outside the classroom, students gain 21st century technical skills necessary for future occupation.
